As they were traveling along the road, they came to some water. The eunuch said, "Look, here is some water. What is to prevent me from being baptised?"

And Philip said, "If you believe with all your heart, you may." The eunuch said in reply, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." Then he ordered the chariot to stop, and Philip and the eunuch both went down into the water, and he baptised him.

When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away, and the eunuch did not see him again, but he went on his way rejoicing.
